

2020 District Update and Report

THE JACK LONDON IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT is focused on creating and maintaining a welcoming and vibrant Jack London. Founded in 2013, the Improvement District is led by a 14-member volunteer Board of Directors representing a thriving and engaged mixed-use community.

2020 has brought unprecedented challenges with a global pandemic impacting nearly every aspect of life and neighborhood activity, and also a call to action for racial justice. Our organization has comitted itself to promote diversity, equity, and inclusion in our work, and is pivoting along with our resilient and innovative merchants to navigate new safe ways of doing business.

This neighborhood remains a cultural gem and entertainment destination, a publicly accessible waterfront, a transportation and logistics hub, a residence for over 4,000 people, a one-hundred-year-old wholesale produce market, a home to legendary black-owned establishments, an artist and fabricator district, and more. As neighborhood stewards and community builders, the Improvement District is working to ensure all are welcome and can thrive in this dynamic place.

Highlights

Marketing & Economic Development: The District promotes Jack London's unique offerings with residents, employees, and visitors, invites new diverse businesses to join the community, and provides platforms for collaborative marketing and business participation including special events and campaigns. This year we launched the well-recieved Jack London Grocery Guide and the new District Map.

Maintenance, Beautification, and Safety: The District works to create safe, welcoming streets, with daily litter and illegal dumping pickup and graffiti abatement. This year streetscape projects included new planters on Broadway, street tree pruning, and new branded street-pole banners. A program for cleaner operations and safer streets in the Historic Wholesale Produce Market is underway.

Government & Community Relations: The District builds community and promotes the neighborhood through events like timely Panel Talks, the annual community block party in August with participation from local businesses, and even virtual events to stay connected and entertained during shelter-in-place. This year community forums focused on the Broadway gateway, the 5th & Oak St. community cabins, and the Oakland-Alameda pedestrian bridge. The District is also engaged in long-term development advocacy in the Downtown Oakland Specific Plan, Howard Terminal Community Benefits Agreement, Oakland-Alameda Access Project, and cross-sector homelessness solutions.
